

**CUMULATIVE BID TRAFFIC STUDY ROOM AND BOARD EXPANSION PRESENTATION** – TDA Colorado, a transportation engineering consulting firm, has completed its cumulative traffic study related to the present and future CCN Business Improvement District (BID) development. Increased BID development will occur and is welcomed by CCN residents, but it is also important to predict future traffic volumes and flows and, most importantly, to find ways to mitigate traffic in order to maintain and enhance CCN residential quality of life. Please attend and participate in this important discussion.

The architects for Room and Board (corner of 2<sup>nd</sup> and Detroit) will present the planned building expansion. 
# KEY CUMULATIVE BID TRAFFIC STUDY FACTS AND PROJECTIONS

As a preview of the interesting and challenging information that you will receive at the presentation of the cumulative BID traffic study at the General Resident Meeting on Wednesday, October 2nd here are some facts and projections on BID growth in the next 10 years.

- 1. 2013 BID Building Square Footage 2.6 million square feet
- 2. 2013 BID Property Lot Square Footage 2.4 million square feet
- 3. 2013 Cherry Creek Shopping Center Comparison 1.15 million square feet of retail space
- 4. Current Development Underway or Pending Startup 4 Mil 900,000 building square feet or 11% of BID property
- 5. Identified Future Development Sites 143,000 square feet or an additional 6% of BID property
- 6. Current and Identified Developments Plus Assumed 50% of Remaining BID Over Next 10 Years – Size of total BID will increase from 2.6 million building square feet to 5.3 million square feet or over twice the present size.
- 7. 2<sup>nd</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue Development over Next 10 Years with **Assumed 50% Growth** – Size of total building square feet will increase from 875,000 SF to 3.1 million SF or 2.5 times the present size of buildings between 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>

as its political and intellectual life and this is reflected in to the use of the school by the church, the congregation the very early appearance of churches. The earliest moved to the second floor of a grocery store by the alley church in the area was the Congregational Church, which was holding services at Harman School as early as 1885. The first salaried minister arrived in 1888. Reverend W. L. Gilman replaced the ministerial volunteers who came out from Denver. According to the memory of an old time Harman resident, Rev. Gilman "rented a 5 room house on the 400 block of Madison for \$3.00. It had a pump outside and an outhouse on the alley. After the family settled in, the congregation held a "pound party" for them. The gifts might include a sack of flour, 30# of sugar, potatoes, 10# of Oatmeal, coal and kindling. He once got 6 laying hens and 2 hens with chicks. This was his early pay."

The Community of Harman valued its spiritual life as well When the Board of Trustees at Harman School objected on the south side of Fourth and Clayton. Over the years they met in donated properties like vacant houses, tents and a carriage house at 3rd and Detroit before a permanent location could be found. In 1891, a new church was built at Fourth and Cook and the name was changed to the Fourth Avenue Congregational Church. The Rocky Mountain News of January 1, 1892, described the new church as "Harman's architectural pride, and a building of unusual beauty for a suburb. It is built of brick with stone trimmings, cathedral leaded windows, a fine bell, and has a seating capacity of eight hundred. Its cost was \$4,000."
